

PRIMARY AND SECONDARY HEALTH CARE FOR CHRONIC DISEASE PATIENTS IN HOMA BAY





WHO WE ARE

Founded in 1971 Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF)/Doctors Without Borders is an international, independent, medical humanitarian organization that delivers emergency aid to people affected by armed conflict, epidemics, exclusion from healthcare and natural disasters in more than 70 countries around the world. MSF offers assistance to people based on need, irrespective of tribe, race, religion, gender or political affiliation. Our actions are guided by medical ethics and the principles of neutrality and impartiality.

BACKGROUND

MSF started its activities in Homa Bay in 1997 in response to the high HIV burden in Nyanza province, Kenya, which had an estimated prevalence rate of 35%. MSF began by offering free HIV testing, counseling, and treatment for opportunistic infections at Homa Bay District Hospital.

In 2001, MSF in collaboration with the Ministry of Health provided the first free Antiretroviral Therapy (ART) at the Homa Bay District Referral Hospital.

Kenya is experiencing an epidemiological transition in disease burden with the rapidly increasing burden of non-communicable diseases (NCDs) which according to the Kenya Non-Communicable Disease (NCD) Strategic Plan 2021–2025, NCDs account for approximately 39% of all deaths in the country.

In 2021, MSF shifted focus to a wider scope of chronic diseases, to address the increasing burden of non-communicable diseases in Homa Bay Sub County.

CURRENT ACTIVITIES

MSF supports two adult medical wards (one male and one female) and the TB wards of Homa Bay County Teaching and Referral Hospital (HBCTRH) with human resources training, and mentorship of staff), designing standard operating procedures (SOPs) and protocols, buffering medication to MoH pharmacy, laboratory support (point-of-care tests), and supporting blood donation campaigns.

MSF has been providing diagnostic, treatment, and follow up care for patients with Kaposi Sarcoma (KS) at MSF run post-discharge clinic (PDC). Kaposi sarcoma is a cancer that primarily affects people with weakened immune systems, including those with AIDS.

To reduce deaths and complications associated with chronic diseases, since 2021, MSF has been implementing a **decentralised**, **simplified model of chronic disease care** in two Primary Health Care (PHC) facilities in Nyalkinyi and Marindi. This includes an established referral framework for continuum of care, while supporting a differentiated model of care, community screening and awareness.

MEDICAL CARE FOR PATIENTS ADMITTED INTO THE THREE ADULT MEDICAL WARDS INCLUDING TB WARDS

Point-of-care laboratory serving MSF supported wards and supporting the MoH blood bank and blood donation campaigns.

- Treatment of critically ill patients with medical conditions including advanced HIV and complications of non-communicable diseases.
- Post-Discharge Clinic to follow up on unstable patients discharged from the inpatient wards for 8 weeks.
- Chemotherapy treatment for Kaposi Sarcoma patients. End of life and palliative care for patients in Homa Bay County Teaching and Referral Hospital and Homa Bay sub-county through home-based care treatment, and supporting palliative care unit.

POST DISCHARGE CLINIC

MSF also provides post-discharge treatment and followup for unstable patients from the inpatient wards with chronic diseases including HIV, and non-communicable diseases at the post discharge clinic, while providing longterm continuity of care through linkages.

- Follow up on unstable patients discharged from the inpatient wards for 8 weeks.
- Chemotherapy treatment for Kaposi Sarcoma patients. End of life and palliative care for patients in Homa Bay County Teaching and Referral Hospital and Homa Bay sub-county through home-based care treatment, and

supporting palliative care unit.

DECENTRALISED SERVICES: NON-COMMUNICABLE DISEASE CARE IN HOMA BAY TOWN SUB-COUNTY

- Two integrated chronic disease care clinics for Diabetes, Hypertension, Asthma, Epilepsy, Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease, and Sickle Cell Disease at Nyalkinyi and Marindi primary-level facilities with simplified protocols to reduce deaths complications associated with chronic diseases
- MSF in Homa Bay has pioneered a differentiated service delivery model for management of Diabetes and Hypertension to be responsive to patient needs.
- In the decentralized sites, MSF provides four differentiated service delivery models of care to strengthen the screening and management for stable chronic disease patients with simplified protocols. These models are facility-based, community-based, standard of care and fast-track.
- Strengthening referral network between different level facilities and the Homa Bay County Teaching and Referral Hospital (HBCTRH)
